It happened at last! The international friendship-celebrating opening ceremony took place yesterday night. About five thousand people from different countries of the world were in

volved in the loud, spectacular, hair-raising impressive Festival!

dancing. Within a few minutes the town marquees were crowded with incredible huge animals, funky costumes and thousands of smiling faces of every colour.

All the preparations seemed to be a bit messy, but they brought a lot of fun. People were allowed to do everything: making crazy costumes, dyeing their hair and faces and bodies, shouting, trumpeting, playing drums and making as much noise as they can! And of course folks used their imagination in creating the image of each town. Some tried to use elements of their national culture – such as the Indigo Snake and the tom-tom music. I've never seen such extravagant garments!

Green Turtle town carried a huge banner with an image of turtle on it. Yellow parrot town were dressed in yellow t-shirts and bandanas, the inhabitants of the Red Wolf area got red from head to toe! Then out of the blue there appeared a Blue Whale procession with an enormous fish tail in the air. It was a fantastic sight!

At the beginning of the ceremony the messages from every country were announced, so we would know who was present at Global Village. The Opening Ceremony turned out to be a catchy performance! The presenters appealed to the audience in three languages – English, German and Spanish – to make everyone understand and feel united!

The speeches were followed by an artistic dance with multicoloured banners symbolizing the eight Millennium Development Goals.

A speech by Kofi Annan was broadcast, and his words sounded like an appeal to the younger generation: "I know you will not accept the world where others die of hunger, remain illiterate, lack human dignity. So please, make sure your voices are heard, make sure your generation is the one to change the world for the better!"

There followed the camp song and amazing fireworks and celebrations!

Plug in to the Powerpod

Today, I went to the Powerpod in the Edinburgh village to see how the electricity it generates is being put to use. Martin Well, who was involved with building the pod, gave me a tour. On one side of the pod are some solar panels, these are used to heat water.

Martin poured some water out of the tap on the side for me feel. Considering how grey the start of the day was, it was very warm.

The propeller and solar panels on the roof create electricity which can be used to power everything from iPods and mobile phones to hair straighteners.

Inside the pod the walls are covered with plug sockets, switches and other pieces of

baffling equipment.

When I was there, a box of lamps, a mobile phone, an iPod and some batteries were recharging, while the tank of heated water lies at the back of the pod.

An extension cable leads off to the kitchen. It is currently being used to power a light, but, according to Martin, it'll be powering a smoothie maker later in the week.

According to Martin, there's currently a surplus of electricity. "At the moment we have too much," he said. "It's so good that we're generating too much energy, so if people want to come and charge their mobiles they are very welcome to!"

Other images from places as varied as Greenland, Kenya, the Marshall Islands and Japan capture the beauty of these natural and urban landscapes, whilst examining the effects of

If you take part in the Sustainability programme at Global Village, you'll get a chance to do these four things – and earn an award to prove it.


After our workshops, we'll be running drop-in sessions to tell you how you can sign up for the John Muir Award, a scheme which encourages people to learn about and look after wild places.

Even your newspaper is sustainable

Here at The Global Voice, we're in on the sustainability act too.

We're printing a thousand copies of an eight-page newspaper every day – that's 800,000 pages across Global Village – and we've tried to be as sustainable as possible.

The newspaper you're holding has been printed by the Kent Art Printers Ltd (KAP), a local company. The inks have been derived from a sustainable vegetable oil base (rather than mineral oil) and the sheet has been printed using alcohol-free dampening to reduce emissions of volatile organic compounds, no-process platemaking (no water, chemistry or hazardous waste) and renewable power.

The Big Hand: ska the Woodcraft way

Ska stars The Big Hand, who are playing at Global Village tonight and tomorrow night, have a long tradition with Ealing Woodcraft Folk – or at least some of them do.

Lead singer and lead guitarist Tim Lomas joined the Folk when he was 6, and he's now 27 and still hanging around. His sister Lauren is an Ealing leader; the band's manager, Ingi Bjarnason, is also a leader in Ealing, as is the band's webmaster, Ralph Sleight.

But for the other members of the band, their first encounter with the Woodies was at last year's Venturer Camp. And they weren't at all sure about camping.

"To be honest, they weren't sure what to make of it. But they got there and they just had the best time," says Luke. "Everyone gets made to feel so welcome and everyone is up to have a good time."

The Big Hand was formed in Edinburgh by Tim and some of the members of a 14-piece soul band he'd set up when he was at university. They played there for many years until a year ago when they decided to take things more seriously and moved down to London, at the

same time that bassist Luke Martin – an old friend of Tim's – joined the band, which also comprises drummer and singer Paul Skelding and trumpeter Phil Ramsay.

"In Edinburgh just about everybody in the city knew of us, but no one outside of Edinburgh," Luke says. "We knew we had what it takes to make a real go of it, and we knew we could never do it just based in Edinburgh."

"It has been quite a hard year just in terms of playing to as many people as we can. But it's really starting to pay off. We try to go where people will have us."

The band's name came from one of their early songs.

"It was about a guy with one big hand and one small hand, and the idea was that everyone has got something that makes them a bit strange and could be a reason to feel like an outsider. So if everyone is quite strange that that unites people."

Dance to The Big Hand in the Cornwallis building at 8:30 p.m. tonight, and hear them in an acoustic set at the Fairytrade Cafe at 9:30 p.m. on Tuesday.

Youth Parliament: got work to do

You might know someone who has been injured or even killed fighting for their rights. You may have been on a protest march. Or you might be wondering how things would be if there were people to vote for who you really felt were worth it.

What difference do these actions make? What can young people do that actually changes things? Sometimes you know you have contributed to change, and it's a good feeling. Sharing that experience and joining in the change is even better.

The Youth Parliament is concentrating on what action is effective and how we can make things happen. It's more about how young people can best make changes than about discussing whether meat is better than nuts.

At Global Village a big chunk of young people from across camp with a host of experiences make up our Youth Parliament. We live in different cultures and we don't do things the same way. From the way we run our kitchens on camp, and organise our youth groups, to our approaches to campaigning... there are surprises for all of us.

It's one part of the Democracy Centre and runs every day except Saturday. It isn't the same people every day, although many people will want to see it through to the final declaration on youth empowerment.

Starting with the experiences we all have of trying to change things, we will take a magnifying

glass to what we do and start to build up ideas of what really works. Change is not about making yourself feel good, but surely it's more sustainable if it does!

Then the parliament will decide on its top ten themes around which the debate about effective action will revolve. Global Village is rooted in the millennium goals, but we won't be stopping there.

Taking these themes or issues the parliament will look closely at action. Maybe one question for debate will be: How do we make youth action effective to get rid of extreme poverty and hunger?

The whole series of debates leads up to the grand finale: the youth parliament and summit and the Youth Parliament Declaration for Empowerment and Action.

And in the village: For just one day each village will have the opportunity to run things differently. There'll be some 'choice' when you open your envelope, and then maybe you'll suddenly have all the adults doing the cooking or just one person making all the decisions. Maybe all decisions will have to be made by everyone in the village ... and they talked for 24 hours....

Your representatives on the Youth Parliament can feed back the experience.

Wanted: 2 to 4 people from every village to come to the Youth Parliament. You can change each day, or some might like to keep coming. You will be welcome. We also need people to translate.
