Saharawis are here at last

There were smiles on the faces of the residents of Village 15 last night as five more members of the delegation from Western Sahara arrived at Global Village following a grueling five-day journey.

The group left their refugee camp last Friday and travelled on to Argelia, where they had to wait until Sunday for visas to be granted. After catching the first available flight, the group reached site yesterday evening.

The group represent UJSARIO, an organisation that works with young people living in the

refugee camps in Western Sahara. It aims to help with day-to-day life – especially in terms of assisting with education, which is difficult to access for young Saharawi people. The organisation also provides activities for young people to do in their free time by running workshops on health and education topics.

Whilst at camp, the six delegates will act as ambassadors promoting the cause of independence for the Saharawi

people. Previously a Spanish colony, the country was invaded by Morocco in 1975, leading to thousands of people fleeing to camps in the Algerian desert – one of the most difficult

environments on Earth.

Delegation member Zahra Abdaulahi, who arrived at Global Village a few days ago, was happy to see her colleagues. "It is the first time I have had the chance to experience a camp like this, with young people from all over

the world," she said. Zahra was also looking forward to meeting a lot of enthusiastic young people, and to taking part in an event where young people work together and are actively involved in the decision-making process.

Zahra is also looking forward to working with others to influence decision makers – and taking action as well as simply talking about the Global Village themes.

The newly arrived delegation spent their first evening presenting a series of short films in the Global Village cinema, informing others about the situation in Western Sahara – something they hope to continue throughout the festival.

Green power saves the day in Green Turtle

When the mains power failed in Green Turtle town early last night it looked like the evening's news would have to be cancelled for two towns: Green Turtle because of the power failure and Blue Whale because Green Turtle supplies the TV signal to Blue Whale.

The Eco Trailer was towed out of village 34 to the Green Turtle Town Marquee, and the power restored, the news was broadcast to a lively audience and disaster averted. GV-TV weather reporter Sophie was distraught at the thought of two towns not being able to watch her. After the successful broadcast she was seen hugging and kissing the trailer.

There have been power problems around the festival with failures at Tillyards and Mest-Up. "I am having lots of trouble with these generators" said Owen Hastings from Stage Tech "I wish that they were all as reliable as the solar systems around camp".

Renewable energy supplies Blue Whale Town and Village 28 (Wales). The Edinburgh Powerpod provides power and heat to Village 28, and the Eco Trailer provides power for Village 34. Other smaller systems are in many villages.



• Not for Village 16 a perfect circle of tents where everyone can see each other. The big village, featuring Cheltenham, Gloucester, Hungary, Finland and Chile found there was nothing like enough room for all their tents, forcing them to set up two, three or even four tents deep.

"We had a boundary dispute with one of our neighbours," said leader Duncan Siret. "But we still don't have much space."

To add to the fun it has open mic nights, anyone who wants to perform can do so. People all over Global Village have been enjoying Tillyards and we hope you do too.

Pass for Peace: It's all kicking off

from Your Pass for Peace Team

The much hyped Global Village football tournament, Pass For Peace, has finally begun with several exciting first round ties and eye-catching performances.

The opening match of the tournament took place on Monday 31st July, and saw Village 26 of Green Turtle Town wrap up a convincing 7 - 4 victory over neighbours Village 22, with V26 leading by six goals to nil at one point. Their prize for this victory will be a second round tie with Village 23, whose Austrian and Danish stars helped secure a 4 - 1 win over Village 24.

The dreaded penalty shoot-out reared its ugly head in the clash between Green Turtle's Village 29 and Village 28 after a 1 - 1 stalemate after normal time, with Harry Byrne netting for V29. It would appear that V29 kept their cool better than V28 as they managed to win the shoot-out 3 - 1. The spirit of Pass for Peace was reflected in the match as V29 sportingly allowed V28 to have an extra two players.

The match of the day, however, was to be in the Yellow Parrot

group where Village 19 took on Village 16 in a tense encounter. 16 took an early lead but were pegged back by 19 who equalised and then went on to take the lead thanks to an audacious flick from Lithuanian frontman Romualdas Urbonas. Urbonas almost added to his tally in the second half when a powerful header flew just over. Despite heavy pressure from V16, they were not able to make some promising moves count and were punished when man of the match Matthew Taylor scored with a fine solo effort to make sure of a 3 - 1 win for V19.

The field next to the Cornwallis Building witnessed two very intriguing games on Tuesday morning. In the match that kicked off first, the second round tie between Village 26 and Village 23 in the Green Turtle Group, V23 narrowly edged out V26 2 - 0 and will now play in their group final. Meanwhile in the Yellow Parrot Group, the true spirit of the 'Pass For Peace' tournament was there for all to see: hordes of supporters, enthusiasm and a match played in a fair manner between Villages 14 and 21 all made for an enjoyable experience. Unfortunately there had to be a winner and it was V14 that ran out eventual 4 - 3 winners. Particularly pleasing about this fixture was the way that both teams sent out their elfins and pioneers in the first half, followed by their venturers and district fellows in the

second. This meant that everyone got a fair game and a chance to play. At one point, in this friendly encounter, two daring streakers ran onto the pitch. The crowd went wild.

Unfortunately 'Pass For Peace' reps cannot attend and write up all matches, but if you would like to see your village featured in the 'Global Voice', feel free to drop in a short summary of your match to the media centre and we will endeavour to include them in the paper. Keep in mind all first round matches should

have been played by now and results and future fixtures are available to view in your town marquee. We will also be visiting villages to keep you informed.

Already some teams are through to the third round, perhaps this should act as a wake-up call to those who haven't yet played their second (or even their first!) match. Remember, it is not difficult to "Pass for Peace", just meet up with the Village you are scheduled to play and have a kick around. In every town

marquee you will find fixtures and don't forget to post your results.

An exciting twist has been added to the Global Village tournament to encourage more friendly games: There is a possibility of making the finals merely on fair-play co-operation and general good sportsmanship, not forgetting the fair-play award which has been in place from the start of the tournament.

Focus on Child Exploitation

Hundreds of people crammed into the Child Exploitation Centre yesterday to hear a powerful story of a former child soldier from Sudan. Emmanuel Jal held the audience spellbound as he spoke of his life, walking thousands of miles across countries ravaged by civil war, and how he became a successful hip-hop star with an international career.

Civil war broke out in Sudan in 1983. Like all conflicts it's a complicated web of problems: natural disasters like famine and drought are aggravated by abuse of power by those in charge.

Sudan is divided along ethnic and religious lines between the North and South: the Muslim Arab Government in the North and the Christian Africans in the South. The fighting was sparked by the government's attempt to install Islamic Sharia law across the country and by a grab for control of the oil reserves in the centre.

After walking hundreds of miles with other orphans to Ethiopia to go to school, Emmanuel was recruited as a child soldier. By the time he was eight years old he had learnt how to fire a machine gun. At 13 he was fighting on the front line.

In 1991 Ethiopia erupted into civil war as well - the thousands of child soldiers were again forced to flee. Named the 'Lost Boys', they roamed between wars, battling to survive against guns and hunger.

Eventually Emmanuel managed to escape after an American aid worker took him in and smuggled him to Kenya. He was able to use his passion and experience to write songs - drawing on the pain of a child forced to kill.

A success in Kenya led to his discovery. He's now able to perform internationally and also use his music to inspire new songwriters from around the globe. His performances have extra impact because he's now working with a producer from North Sudan. The first time such a collaboration has taken place.

He'll be running songwriting workshops here at Global Village and hopes his story, painful as it is to tell, can help others to find their voice.

"Most musicians that you see are people who have come from a painful background, and they have suffered," Emmanuel says.

Although he says it gives him pain to talk about what happened to him, he has chosen to do so at Global Village because he could not give up the chance to tell so many young people and encourage them to fight to prevent children being recruited as soldiers.

Q: Hi Emmanuel. How are you?

A: I'm fine.

Q: Out of all the people you have you have met in all your days, who is the most important to you?

A: Every single man I have met has helped my life to be like this so they are all equally important to me.

Q: If you had two wishes what would they be?

A: When I die I go to heaven, and the world will be at peace and learn to share.

Q: What message are you trying to give with your music?

A: I am trying to represent child soldiers and reveal their message to the world.

Q: Out of all the people who you have met until this day who would you thank most?

A: I thank so many people so much I can't decide who to choose.

Q: Oh, and lastly, can I have your autograph?

A: Get in the queue.

The Exploitation of Children Centre looks at children's rights, and the ways in which some children around the world are denied those rights. Children are exploited in all sorts of different ways, and, as you can see on this page today, we had a former child soldier visiting here at Global Village.

In addition to workshops and activities where you can learn about children who are being exploited around the world, our theme also has a creative twist. We have poetry, drama and music activities across camp for you to enjoy.

You might have seen in yesterday's paper that we're playing host to Music for Change, who are leading music-making workshops for the rest of this week - check out our interview with one of their performers, Emmanuel.

Come along to some of our activities and explore this complicated issue.

The centre is also hosting African gum-boot dancing, with teacher Lucky, from Zimbabwe. It is a dance that miners do in their wellies after work in Zimbabwe and South Africa.

Gum boot dancing links to exploitation of children because the miners who danced were child labourers in some cases.

The gum boot dancing is going on until Friday.

I have experienced a day reporting in the Exploitation of children centre and have gone from having a grin on my face during the Gum Boot Dancing to having a tear in my eye nearly all the way through the Children of war in Sudan workshop.

We talked to some of the girls in the queue and they agreed that it was a bit of a mystery.

Should people really spend so long in the shower at a camp like Global Village 06? And is it really necessary at all?

In the Danish delegation, we think that people should spare the water and have quicker showers so that then our next

generation have the same easy access to clean water as we have.

Another reason for long queues could be that the showercabins are used for people getting changed, which is a waste of time for people in the queues.

Think about that next time you're getting washed!

As we sat drinking our coffee, a constant stream of people passed by, which gave the cafe a busy metropolitan feel. Fairtrade also has a stage, which works on an open-mic basis during the daytime, and features a variety performers in the evening.

Unfortunately only instant coffee was on offer, but it was

the ever popular Fairtrade 5065 which is good as far as instant coffee goes, and was served at a reasonable strength. At 60p a cup however, we did feel it was slightly steep. A 10p discount is offered if you bring your own mug, but we did not receive this, presumably as we were using Tillyards mugs.

The cafe stocks a wide variety of snacks, including freshly baked two-tone cake, popcorn, candyfloss, sweets and chocolate. Although being made from cake mix, the cake was flavoursome and lightly textured, although perhaps a little dry. At 60p for a generous slice, with chocolate icing on top, we thought it was pretty reasonable.

We spoke to Ellie and Laurie (DFs from Hebden Bridge) who helped out organising the cafe. Ellie thought the cafe's central location and vibrant atmosphere made it the ideal place to meet people. She told us that Fairtrade is a workers co-op, so all the staff have an equal role in running the cafe. After a pleasant cup of coffee with some fellow DFs in Fairtrade, we headed on down to Tillyards to see what they had to offer. Tillyards focus much more on providing a quality range of freshly ground coffees and speciality

teas. Four varieties of coffee are on offer permanently, and when we popped in they also had a guest Peruvian Mocha blend on. All the coffees are served as Cappuccino, Latte, Espresso, Americano etc. The coffee that we had was amazing, the best cup of coffee we've had in days! Tillyards also sell panninis and pizza which is baked in a wood fired oven, which are rounered to be delicious.

The Tillyards staff have obviously put a lot of effort into creating a quirky space to chill out. The atmosphere very relaxed, and the cafe is decorated with salvaged objects such as bikes, craved stiffs and old record sleeves. During the daytime a eclectic mix of music is played over the cafes PA system, and there are live performers in the evening. Over the next week look out for Indigo Moon - a street theatre group, singer-storyteller extraordinaire Eric Maddern.

Tillyards operate as a consumer co-op, which you can join for the princely sum of three pounds. This gets you a rather snazzy mug along with a vote as to which charity the profits will go and discounts of up to 33%. Joining is a must if you intend to be a regular customer!

We originally set out to discover which of the the camp cafes is the best. However we've realised that each of the cafes have their own unique charm. Fairtrade is the place to go to meet people, listen to live acts and generally feel that you have the finger on Global

Village's pulse. However, if you want to relax and drink quality tea and coffee in a calming atmosphere, Tillyards is the place to go.
