Green light for the sick village

The residents of Village 12 celebrated after being given the all-clear yesterday following what camp health officials said was "a mild outbreak of vomiting".

Three under-11s and one 18-year-old were afflicted on Tuesday, leading to a decision that the residents should stay in their village for 24 hours to prevent the possibility of their spreading the virus. However there were no further reports of illness overnight.

By Wednesday afternoon, everyone was fit and well and camp health and safety officer Josh Riordan gave the green light for the young people to rejoin the central activities.

"This is a very clean and carefully-organised village," he said. "And the short-lived problem was just one of those things."

Global Villagers are reminded that in a big camp with a lot of people living in a very small space, there is great potential for illness to spread if hygiene isn't maintained.

Remember to wash your hands after using the toilet. Keep your kitchen tent clean and use separate chopping boards for raw meat, vegetables and dairy products.

If you feel ill, contact your village first-aider, who will contact the Global Village health service if required.

Not so Fairytrade...

The fair-trade credentials of the Fairytrade Cafe have been thrown into doubt by the discovery of non-fair trade goods on their shelves.

Punters have been served Cadbury's chocolate and Walker's crisps, as well as Tesco Value juices – none of them fair trade, according to the fair trade website.

Ellie Fairhall, one of the cafe's representatives, said that the current stock is "emergency

supplies" after unprecedented sales of fruit juices over the first two days. The fair trade suppliers to the cafe were unable to deliver new stock immediately, thus requiring a speedy, if non-fair trade solution.

Asked why the cafe bought from a mega-bucks company rather than purchasing fair trade products from the supermarket, or at least supporting local businesses, she conceded: "We're shit, you try running a cafe."

As hard as a job like this may be, which is appreciated and admired by all, the cafe seems to be disgracing its own mission statement and ethics. As the chief supplier of confectionery to Global Village it may seem that Woodies have lost their faith in the Cafe's ability to spread the good fair trade message.

However, fear not, fair trade is on its way. The cafe expects a delivery of stock within the next couple of days.

Recycling Plastics

Recycling plastics into a new form takes a lot of resources.

The eco-footprint of recycled plastics is almost as high as those made from new so the only way to really cut down the impact of using them is to buy as little as possible in the first place.

Almost all plastics are made from oil, which will eventually run out. Even those which claim to be biodegradable aren't particularly sustainable, as their degradable components are made from plants and rot down to produce methane, which contributes to climate change. Growing it also takes up room that could be used to grow food.

Tetrapacks? They are a mixture of plastic, card and metal foil so difficult to recycle. You could clean them, squash them flat and bring them to the sustainability centre to become part of the huge animal rising behind Groovy Movie.

What can I do?

There are lots of different types of plastics, and, in theory at least, they can all be recycled.

In practice, however, some are much easier to recycle those.

Different types of plastic are identified by numbers. They are usually printed inside the little triangular recycling logo.

We CAN recycle

Types 1, 2, 3 – the most common, include drink bottles, milk bottles, food trays and many other things.

Type 4 – usually for plastic bags.

We CAN'T recycle:

- Crisp packets
- Cellophane
- Yoghurt pots

A Message from Lloyd



The Democracy Centre on camp is one of the largest and, by all accounts, one of the most exciting centers on camp. We have a number of main areas of work, from the PARTY Court – where drug companies to the asylum process will be put on trial – to the Youth Parliament, is it all happening down in the Kent Pavillion.

Six years ago world leaders gathered and agreed the eight Millennium Development Goals to help improve the lives of

thousands of millions of people around the world. Unfortunately those world leaders have failed the people of the world, they will not be able to meet the targets in time. Young people here at Global Village have been meeting daily to look at what they can do to make the difference. Often protest makes us feel good but the young people who have been filing through the doors of the Youth Parliament are committed to making and creating change to this world that is effective as well as making us as individuals feel good.

From today the Youth Parliament will be working differently, with the Cocoa Parliament today looking at making fair trade reality for everyone. On Friday we will be creating six commissions around the questions that have been published in today's paper. We need villages to send at least two people to participation in these commissions. These groups will research and work to get answers and actions to the questions that the parliament is working towards.

Actions are the name of the game and the commissions will be open on Saturday and Sunday for people to feed into and devise how we can change this world into a better, fairer place. The commissions will present their work to the whole of Global Village for the final youth Parliament and Declaration of Youth Empowerment on Monday. The commission will be making decisions how we can change this world where past generations have failed.

We can make a difference but only if we stand strong and create change that is a reality, we will make a difference if young people of the world stand up together. We can stand together only if everyone at Global Village starts that chain reaction.

Where next?

In the Youth Parliament the call goes out: 'action stations'. Modelled on the Earth Summit held at 2001 International Camp, these are debating stations where ideas are melted down and nuggets of gold emerge from the whole parliament. Everyone becomes involved in the decision making process but in a way that encourages open discussion.

Starting with a look at what democracy is about, the Youth Parliament moves on to look at different forms of action. Selecting a few issues to concentrate on, the emphasis shifts to how to change things. 'What can young people do to close Guantanamo Bay?' for example. Action is most sustainable if people get a buzz out of doing it and where it can be seen to make a change.

Across the camp there is a wealth of experience of resistance, protest, and ideas about making the world a better place for everyone. Young people want to do a better job at changing it than previous generations have. What were they doing taking us into the 21st century with fireworks and spectaculars all over the world only to plunge us into war upon war? Governments cannot be trusted. The United Nations repeatedly fails to resolve conflicts.

The Youth Parliament motto could be "Motivate: make change; keep on carrying on." It hopes to end camp with a Global Village Declaration on Youth Empowerment that will take Global Village forwards into new directions and new and effective actions to make change.

Sometimes it feels like we are stuck in this small box staring at computer screens in the middle of a field where lots of other people are having a really fun, interesting and educational time. It's difficult to get out and really find out what's going on, what works, what doesn't, what could be improved, how people are feeling and what global village is really like! Today I went for a wander... I spoke to different people from the themes and centres, from villages, and towns, the young and the slightly older. I've asked questions and I've listened to the answers, as a result there are going to be some changes around here, so I hope you're listening too!

Firstly, and most importantly, today there will be no sign up sheets. Lots of people complained that it didn't seem to matter whether they had signed up or not. Sometimes workshops have no people signed up but lots of people turn up and sometimes workshops have lots of people signed up and no one turns up. We have also had difficulties recruiting volunteers to staff the town squares and bring all 500 sheets back. Instead we will publish complete lists of all of the activities with the descriptions, locations, and maximum number of participants in all villages. They will be put up during the

afternoon of the day before so that in the evening people can look at the activities for the following day.

Secondly, and particularly helpfully, all theme and centre coordinators have been asked to ensure that if an activity is cancelled they put a poster near the entrance to their centre to notify any people hoping to do that activity. The info point will also have a copy of all activities taking place so that people can see what they are able to go to instead.

Thirdly, and quite critically, please report major problems and incidents to the info point as soon as they happen, it is much easier for the central team to respond if we know as soon as possible.

Fourthly, and very excitingly, there are still spaces available for YouDay where you, the participants, run the programme. Among a lot of other exciting things so far we have a model United Nations, music making workshops, a big rally about the conflict in the middle east, food tasting, wide games in the woods, and dance classes. If you would like to add your activity to this list please pick up a form from the info point and fill in the details.

Finally, and ridiculously enjoyably, the open day is fast approaching! There are not only great workshops and drop in activities for campers and guests, an international market where you can set up a stall to sell your goods, services or perform your tricks, but also a chance to perform live on the main stage! It's going to be awesome!

That's all folks! If you have any comments, compliments or complaints that you would like to feed my way, please visit the info point and pick up a programme feedback form, as much as it gets a bit lonely and boring in the office it's much better if people go to the info point first, they know everything almost!

On Tuesday evening Seize the Day played an upbeat gig to the global villagers. Seize the Day said after the gig that the audience were wonderful and that the quality of the sound was fantastic.

Many of the audience were eager to comment on the band's performance. Some said: "the gig was great," others said: "It was o.k. but I was expecting disco, I prefer disco to folk." Even if some villagers didn't enjoy the concert, they had to admit that the band members are very talented.

When asked how they would describe their songs, band members Shannon Smy and Theo Simon said: "Our music is bold, beautiful, radical, frontline folk."

In the band, various different instruments are used to create a symphony of lively songs that are easy to sing along to.

Theo plays vocals, derrabuka (Egyptian hand drum), and percussion.

according to Shannon and Theo.

Seize the Day's music is influenced by a range of different things. These include what is happening in the world right now and artists such as Bob Dylan, Holly Near and Rory McCloud.

Shannon and Theo were asked what their favourite song from their recent album was. Theo said: "Rise up, that's got to be my favourite". But Shannon said: "With my hammer", which is coincidentally written by her!

"With my hammer" is about thirteen women who planned to stop hawk jets being sent to kill people in East Timor.

Politicians didn't listen

when the women said that it was a bad thing to do, so the women planned and sent letters but nothing worked, so they took action and hammered the parts of the aeroplane that would be used for war. The thirteen women handed themselves in and were tried in the courts. But after six months in prison they were all found not guilty for their actions.
