Global Village Opens Its Doors



Global Village Youth Festival 2006! After a great start with our explosive opening ceremony more than 4,500 of us have had a brilliant week with inventive and educating workshops. We have been entertained in the evenings with a packed and overlapping night life. We have kept in the know thanks to the media centre with its newspaper and TV and Radio broadcasts. And we have been enjoying Tillyards coffee, and Groovy Movie and the Fairytrade Cafe

Today is the open day and all are welcome to explore this wonderful site and all of its treasure. But the happenings today are not only new to the visitors - there are plenty of new and exciting activities for our dedicated campers who have been enjoying all of the festival already for the past week. If you're looking for somebody to credit this great camp to, look to the Woodcraft Folk, who are organising it on behalf of IFM-SEI.

Why Global Village? Well, it was an idea at the start of the project of a global community, a place where inhabitants of the world

could live together without conflict or oppression, without poverty or prejudice.

That's why there are over 50 countries represented here, many outside of Europe, and why one third of the participants attending GVO6 are not from the United Kingdom.

"Everybody is willing to participate and co-operate in work and in games, and that brings people closer together" said Heladio Ramirez, a member of the Mexican delegation, "and language, traditions, and politics are not important, they all become one, and

that 'one' is Global Village."

Hopefully, the workshops we have been going to have been bearing the themes of the camp in mind, based on the Millennium Development Goals, and Peace and Co-operation. The Child Exploitation area held a meaningful workshop hosting an ex-child soldier, Emmanuel Jal, who now has an international hip-hop career. The Democracy Centre had a few games of Democratic Chess, banishing the usual silence and replacing it with a babble of important debate.

Most of the centres, based

on the festival's themes, are found in the John Hendry and Kent Pavilions, along with the Fairytrade cafe and the cinema.

MEST-UP is an area of the site for young people to get answers to issues they may be unsure about, resolve disputes or just discuss their and others' views on subjects such as identity, sexuality, drugs, and gender.

We hope you enjoy yourself today in Kent County Showground's latest and best incarnation. Oh, and if you get lost, there's a map on page 7.

Events at the camp started with the fantastic opening ceremony last Saturday – a colourful, energetic and refreshingly brief introduction to the camp to welcome everyone, including a message to young people from Kofi Annan himself. The past seven days have seen young people engaged in workshops and discussions as part of the camp's extensive educational programme about the Goals. In spite of the challenging weather, there have been over 500 workshop sessions on a wide range of topics - from simulation games about the cycle of debt and aid, to role plays about conflict resolution.

This open day will bring people together from around the world – whether you are a parent or friend travelling down from London, to a solidarity delegation visiting from Western Sahara.

This camp is truly uniting everyone in an international village of friendship, co-operation, and solidarity, mixed with a healthy sense of fun. While most of us have only been here for a week, a huge amount has been achieved and the spirit of internationalism is evident – the pages of this paper speak for themselves.

We hope you get a chance to sample a bit of that atmosphere – to meet up with your friends and relatives, and to check out some of the key parts of the camp. All our centres will be open for drop-in, with full details in the rest of this newspaper. Weather permitting, there'll be an international concert all afternoon, with many of our delegations from overseas performing. We hope you enjoy it and take a bit of the festival home with you (but leave the sunshine for us please!).

It is a delight for all the organising team to see three years of work come to fruition this past week. It seems a long time ago that the steering committee first met to agree the aims of the project and discuss the idea of 5000 people meeting together in a field in Kent.

Global Village was always meant to be more than just a camp – our educational themes kicked off last summer through our youth conference and leaders' seminar, aimed at giving young people the media skills to get their voices heard in an ever changing world. Over the past twelve months, youth across the globe have taken peer education to a new level, running their own events to get the message of the Millennium Development Goals across, helped by the

Alongside our ten theme centres, there have been a superb range of other activities. The media centre has run a nightly TV news broadcast around the site, complemented by a 24 hour radio station (87.7 FM), and this newspaper. Our innovative MEST-UP centre runs a mediation and peer education service, helping resolve conflicts on camp and providing information on a wide range of topics for young people. On top of this are the fantastic on-site Fairtrade cafés run by young people. And that's just the day programme! The amazing evening entertainment sometimes makes this seem more like a youth music festival – but the events have been carefully chosen to fit closely with the educational programme.

All this has been achieved through the dedication of our volunteers. From the quality and quantity of work achieved, it may not be obvious to the outsider that we have only a handful of staff working behind the scenes. Only through the huge effort of the thousands of volunteers (of all ages) on site can so much be achieved – and we'd like to thank everyone for all their hard work to achieve this global community in a set of fields. From site services to food distribution, programme activities to every individual village, it is hard to imagine now that these fields were empty a mere two weeks ago.

Global Village has been a rollercoaster of emotions, experiences and the elements. To condense it all into this column would do an injustice to the fabulous efforts of everyone involved to create such a diverse event, but just for you, I'm going to try anyway ... here are just some of the daily highlights!

The educational programme kicked off on Sunday, with villages getting to grips with their village activity packs in the morning and exploring the site visiting the various themes and centres in the afternoon. The brilliantly decorated cafés were open selling fair-trade teas, coffees, snacks, pancakes and pizza.

On Monday all of the themes and centres were fully open and delivering a wide variety of activities. The youth

parliament opened to begin to discuss what the key issues of the camp are and how we can carry our message forward. After the workshops were done everyone relaxed to films, comedy and music from Attila the Stockbroker.

Emmanuel Jal from Music for Change arrived on Tuesday; he told his gripping life story of being a child soldier in Sudan through the medium of rap and hip hop. In the evening the Big Hands acoustic set got the party started while Seize the Day ended it with a bang!

On Wednesday the education theme ran the first of its Peer 2 Peer workshops, devised by young people who had received peer education training earlier in the week; workshops have included drumming, sign language and circus skills. Eric Maddern entertained the evening fairtrade crowds with exciting tales, while Waiting for Volkaertz sung their hearts out in the Cornwallis.

Thursday brought the fantastic Cocoa summit to the Youth Parliament, cocoa production, fair trade and chocolate bars made this a very popular activity. The Cooperation Centre's outdoor cooperative fair was undeterred by hideous weather and continued to show villagers the benefit of cooperation over competition. Indigo Moon and wRants wowed the crowds before

everyone went to bed for a well deserved early night. On Friday, the Peace and Conflict Centre performed 'Captain Swing', a fabulous play about the revolutionary history of Kent. Sustainability continued at great pace with many practical workshops and woodland biodiversity walks. MEST UP hosted a party in the evening in the girls, boys and rainbow tents.

Saturday was renamed 'YourDay' where the participants ran the programme, a Model United Nations, music making workshops, a big rally about the conflict in the middle east, food tasting, wide games in the woods, and dance classes were just some of the fabulous activities put on by the villagers.

And that brings us up to today. We are really excited that so many guests and visitors are here, and we hope you enjoy exploring the various centres, the market and the main stage show! There's lots more to come before the camp is over, which will be particularly focussed on looking forward to how the IFM can take all the enthusiasm, knowledge and resources created at this event and use it to build new projects and strengthen current work.

Oh dear! not everything's going quite as smooth as they'd hoped, down at Fairytrade Cafe. They've had problems with almost every aspect of their centre, and to add insult to injury, their finance situation seems to have hit



the metaphorical iceberg too, with share prices plummeting. The winged workers recieved criticism after there emergency stock had a number of unfairtrade products. We tried to get a quote from

Ellie Fairhall (one of the head honchos down at FTC) about the lack of ethical products, but unfortunately she was unable for comment. We are unable to publish any definite statistics about the Fairytrade crisis, but rumours have been flying around of possible

means of how they will overcome this major set back, but things dont look quite as sparkly for the workers of the lively, independant business, right now. Watch this space...

The Media Centre

We've been busy down at the Media Centre during the first week of Global Village.

The Centre works as a team of reporters who meet every morning to decide which stories to cover –and whether to put them in this newspaper, on the radio or on our nightly TV news.

For stories that make the paper, they're researched and written before being put onto pages that we send over to our environmentally-friendly printers. The pages you're holding are printed on 100% post-consumer recycled paper using vegetable-based inks, rather than ones made from oil. If we decide to cover something for the radio, then it'll go out on 87.7 FM, which is live every day from 7–11 in the morning, giving campers across Global Village something to wake up to. The radio content is then

cycled in blocks so there's always something to listen to. We shoot our video footage and edit it back in the Media Centre before broadcasting our news bulletin every evening at 8 pm. It's transmitted to each of the six town marquees at once so everybody can watch it at once.

Finally, at the end of every day, when we've finished with all of our stories, we upload our stories, photos, audio clips and video pieces to the web so you can enjoy them from home.

different activities to help people examine and confront their own preconceived ideas.




Main Stage. Both stock a wide range of fairly-traded goodies!

Education




