### 1. Merkel-Besuch in Israel

Zusammen mit ihrem Kabinett ist Bundeskanzlerin Angela Merkel Ende Februar zu den fünften deutsch-israelischen Regierungskonsultationen nach Israel gereist. Aus Anlass des 50. Jubiläums der deutsch-israelischen Beziehungen, das nächstes Jahr ansteht, trafen sich deutsche Minister mit ihren israelischen Amtskollegen, um diverse Kooperationsprojekte zu planen. Unter anderem wurde angekündigt, dass Deutschland Israel zukünftig in Ländern ohne israelische Botschaft konsularisch vertreten werde.

Die Gespräche zwischen Merkel und dem israelischen Premierminister Benjamin Netanyahu wurden von beiden Seiten als positiv und freundschaftlich beschrieben. Dennoch war unübersehbar, dass die beiden Regierungschefs in vielen Punkten uneins sind. So betonte Netanyahu, dass ein Boykott Israels den Frieden zurückwerfen würde, während Merkel den anhaltenden Siedlungsbau kritisierte. Deutlicher wurden ihre Differenzen bezüglich des iranischen Nuklearprogramms. Während Netanyahu den Europäern "Fehler" in ihrem Verhalten gegenüber dem Iran vorwarf, verteidigte Merkel die Verhandlungen und mögliche Lockerungen der Sanktionen.

### Under Merkel, boycott floodgates stay closed

"At its core, her visit is meant to bolster economic ties between Israel and Germany, not to feed the pollution of political disagreement. [...]

In the international relations lexicon, friendship does not always imply unanimous accord, and Merkel's Israeli hosts must take into account that beyond supporting two states for two peoples, the German chancellor would also like to see Jerusalem split into two capitals. [...] Israel should value her friendship and assistance, even though she disagrees with Jerusalem over such issues. [...]

Merkel is a welcome guest, especially given the fact that anti-Israel boycotts have become quite fashionable in certain circles in Europe. Her government [...] is still closing the floodgates to the boycott movement."

### **Question marks above Germany**

"Germany [...] is gearing up for change. [...]

President Joachim Gauck gave the first signal [saying] that there are individuals who use Germany's guilty past as an excuse for avoiding action and for indolence.' [...]

Social Democrat Frank-Walter Steinmeier [...] claimed that Germany could not remain 'off the field' in political affairs. [...] Over the next several months, we are probably going to see Germany expand its military base -- both in terms of its operational capabilities and the ability to act.

In principle, we could view the shift in a positive light. [...] But there's a catch. [...]

It would be unwise to disregard the signs that Germany's moral and practical responsibility to the Jewish people is undergoing a shift. [...]

Even though Merkel never hesitates to reiterate her commitment to Israeli security, sometimes it seems as though she is justifying it in the spirit of 'saving Israel from itself.' In other words, she disagrees, occasionally using blunt language, with the policy of Israel's current elected government."

#### **Welcoming Germany**

"In the eyes of many Israelis, Germany's Holocaust legacy disqualifies the Germans from expressing anything but wholehearted support for whatever policies a given Israeli government chooses to pursue

The attack on Schulz launched by Netanyahu and Bayit Yehudi head Naftali Bennett, for instance,

was undoubtedly fueled by the knowledge that lashing out at a German politician [...] would be received well by Israelis, who tend to harbor anti-German sentiments. [...]

Instead of caving in to populism, however, both sides – Israel and Germany – need to tone down the rhetoric and try harder to adopt a clear-eyed view of indisputable realities. [...]

After the US, Germany is probably Israel's greatest ally."

### Germany escaping its past by lecturing Israel

"Ceremonialism has been taking over relations between the two countries for a long time now. Too often, it amounts to hollow statements on both sides about the duty to 'remember but forgive'. [...]

The question which should have been asked [...] is whether Germany has done enough to justify trusting the 'land of the criminals,' or has it focused its efforts on causing people to forget the fact that it used to be the 'land of the criminals,' by diverting the attention from the relations between Germans and Israelis – to relations between Israelis and Palestinians.

If Germany is indeed investing so much effort in achieving a durable peace to secure Israel's future, what practical steps has it taken to make the Palestinians and Arab countries cease their endless anti-Semitic incitement [...]? ### 2. Umsturz in der Ukraine

Auch in Israel dominierten der Umsturz in der Ukraine und die russische Intervention auf der Krim für einige Tage die Medien.

Dabei lag der Fokus insbesondere auf der amerikanischen Reaktion auf das russische Vorgehen, sowie auf den Auswirkungen der Revolution auf ukrainische Juden. So war es in den vergangenen Wochen in der Ukraine zu einigen antisemitischen Vorfällen gekommen. In den russischen Medien wird der rechtsnationale Charakter von Teilen der ukrai-

nischen Opposition betont. Andererseits gehörten auch einige Juden zu den pro-westlichen Demonstranten am Maidan-Platz.

### Putin's audacity, Obama's timidity

"Russian brazenness in Crimea is a direct result of American fecklessness. [...] The Russian invasion of the Ukraine is what happens when America is in global retreat. [...]

Obama [...] seeks the weakening of the United States on the global stage as a good and necessary outcome. [...] He explicitly views America's past global performance to be arrogant and high-handed; to be militaristic and not completely moral. [...] His path, then, has been to 'fundamentally transform' America's place in the world; [...] to drag America down from its imperious perch.

It is no wonder, then, that Putin fears Obama not at all, and feels free to re-take the Ukraine without serious repercussion. [...]

Alas, we can expect similar impudence and defiance from the Iranians and Turks, too."

### In the Ukraine crisis, danger to the Jewish and Muslim minorities

"Amid the specter of chaotic civil war, there is also ample reason for concern for the well-being of Ukraine's approximately 300,000 Jews and 500,000 Muslims. [...]

Ukrainians must [...] be vigilant to prevent any recurrence of an age-old propensity to scapegoat the Jews as the source of their misfortunes.

Concern on this score cannot be lightly dismissed given that last month there were attacks on two yeshiva students, who were beaten by anti-Semitic thugs [...] one cannot help but look with disquiet on the fact that one of the three main opposition parties, Svoboda [...], has a history of anti-Semitic rhetoric. Given the tragic history of massive anti-Jewish violence in Ukraine [...], both the government and opposition coalition have a special responsibility to be vigilant in preventing the outbreak of anti-Jewish violence in the coming days."

### Putin, a dangerous friend of the Jews

"If you were relying only on Kremlin-financed media [...] you would be convinced that a dark wave of anti-Semitism has smashed down on this country. [...] I can only point to the conclusion that the rise [in anti-Semitism] has been minimal so far. [...] Highlighting Ukrainian anti-Semitism has been one of [Putin's] central propaganda tools whenever there is a pro-western government in Kiev. [...] His defense of Jews is not the product of any form of liberal or enlightened mindset. [...]

Israel, living in its rough neighborhood, has little choice but to engage with Putin, and really has no business getting involved in the Ukrainian crisis. [...] But in our dealing with the master of the Kremlin, we should never forget what a repressive dictator he is. Whatever the reasons for his ostensible friendship towards the Jews, it is an instrumental and cynical relationship."

### Two core issues the new Ukrainian government will have to tackle on 'the day after'

"Fed by the propaganda aired on Russian TV channels, many in the east tend to see all the revolutionary forces as anti-eastern and increasingly dominated by the radical nationalists. [...]

Even in a best-case scenario, the new central government taking shape in Kiev is sure to be much weaker than its predecessors. The lack of financial resources coupled with the Ukrainian nationalists' desire to secure political achievements in the west-ern regions on the one side, and the above-mentioned entrenchment and suspiciousness in the east on the other, will inevitably undermine the central power."

## 3. Netanyahu trifft Obama in Washington

Anfang März reiste Premierminister Benjamin Netanyahu in die USA. Im Mittelpunkt seiner Reise stand ein Treffen mit Präsident Barack Obama, der ihn drängte, das amerikanische Rahmenabkommen für israelisch-palästinensische Friedensgespräche zu akzeptieren. Aus demselben Grund wird es Mitte März auch zu einem Treffen zwischen Obama und dem palästinensischen Präsidenten Mahmoud Abbas kommen. Während Obama sagte, dass ein Abkommen "Kompromisse von beiden Seiten" erfordere, meinte Netanyahu im Weißen Haus, dass die Palästinenser im Gegensatz zu Israel "ihren Teil" nicht beitrügen.

In einem Interview vor Netanyahus Besuch hatte Obama betont, dass nicht mehr viel Zeit für erfolgreiche Friedensverhandlungen bleibe. Wenn es zu keinem Abkommen käme und die Siedlungsbautätigkeiten anhielten, so Obama, werde Washingtons Fähigkeit, die internationalen Reaktionen darauf einzudämmen, in Zukunft eingeschränkt sein. In den israelischen Medien wurde diese Aussage weitgehend als Drohung interpretiert, mit der die USA – bzw. Obama – Israel andeuteten, dass auf ihre uneingeschränkte Unterstützung nicht mehr viel länger Verlass sei.

### Frameworks for disaster

"What would happen in the event that Israel and the PA do not agree on [...] a 'framework'? This, undoubtedly, will be the focus of Obama's meeting with Netanyahu [...] and subsequently with Abbas [...]. Netanyahu, on the other hand, has one thing on his agenda: preventing a nuclear Iran by any means necessary. [...] Unfortunately, though, Obama is more concerned about extending the deadline for Mideast 'peace,' a euphemism for the establishment of a Palestinian state. [...]

This is very bad news. Whenever Netanyahu impresses upon Obama the urgency of stopping Iran before it's too late, the US president responds by pressuring him into promises of appeasement, if not concrete concessions.

### A partner in the White House

"Netanyahu [...] sees a single goal ahead: To rescue himself and the State of Israel from negotiations that could lead to a withdrawal from the territories

and yield peace [...], hence the efforts to evade the strangling hug of the American partner, which insists on getting both sides to sign a framework agreement. [...] It has become clear that the negotiations are not between Israel and the Palestinians, but between Jerusalem and Washington. [...]

If Washington thinks the continuation of the conflict harms not just the future of Israel but also critical American interests, it would be appropriate to say so openly and publicly."

[...]

For one thing is certain, the president's resort to a newspaper interview on the eve of their talks to issue near-apocalyptic warnings about the disaster Netanyahu risks bringing upon Israel is just about the last thing likely to bolster the prime minister's confidence in their alliance, and just about the last thing likely to encourage Netanyahu to further alienate his hawkish home base by taking steps such as halting building outside the settlement blocs."

Über ein **Schiff mit iranischen Waffenladungen**, das von der israelischen Armee abgefangen wurde:

### Iran: Pulling the strings of terror

"It is in Iran's best interest to provide its allies with weapons, especially terrorist groups. Using terror groups to fight its enemies is one of the most important components in Iran's security outlook because it has proved to be an effective method of deterrence. [...] Assisting terrorist groups fighting Israel has helped Iran in its goal to wear Israel down through armed struggle. [...]

The weapons discovery marked an embarrassment for Iran, which has been endeavoring both to improve its international standing and to paint a positive, moderate picture of itself to reach agreements with Western governments over its nuclear program.

Still, it is likely that the damage to Iran's image will be slight. Its involvement in terrorism has been well-known for years. Capturing this vessel, therefore, is not going to change that very much. And since it is also a high Western priority to reach a final deal over the nuclear issue, it is unlikely that this affair is going to put the brakes on the nuclear talks."
