New Publication: China as a Permanent Member of the United Nations Security Council

China's role as a permanent member of the United Nations Security Council is mostly dominated by such singular events as condoning the military intervention in Libya in 2012 or the blocking of such intervention in Syria. Nevertheless, as this new publication argues, the permanent seat is central to China's foreign policy goals. These goals are more complex than the country's pragmatic reputation for safeguarding principles of national sovereignty and non-interference. For instance, China has increased its involvement in international peacekeeping missions and is now first among the Permanent Five Members in providing troops and ahead of the developing countries in financial contributions: China's commitment reflects awareness of a shifting, increasingly multipolar world order, while at the same time pursuing its national interest and demonstrating its role as a global player. To maintain the Security Council as an integral stabilizing element of international relations, China advocates for

modest Council reform such as more equitable geographical representation, augmented inclusion, particularly of African countries, and more transparent working methods. China's embrace of multilateralism is a principled, incremental transformation of the status quo.

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
