As the systemic consequences of the pandemic can be felt around the globe, the heightened risk of widespread sovereign debt distress in lower- and middle-income countries is a particularly urgent concern.

Together with the Consensus Building Institute, FES New York brought together some of the world's foremost experts in the field and convened the [Roundtable on Responding to the Risks of COVID Debt Distress](#). In a new Roundtable Report, the group offers recommendations that could help manage risks and ensure that governments emerging from debt distress can still invest in much-needed sustainable development.

Beyond global health and economics, the social and political consequences of the pandemic have become painfully clear. Among them, the Covid-19 pandemic has exacerbated a [downward spiral of decreasing peace, security, and inclusivity](#) in many parts of the world. During the UN's High-Level Political Forum (HLPF), we joined partners to discuss what can be done to counteract the world's turn towards authoritarianism and other threats to the achievement of SDG 16.

In the aftermath of year one of the Covid pandemic, we are indeed living through a [critical geopolitical juncture](#), a complex redistribution of global power that is shaking the very foundations of the liberal world order.

What does this mean for the future of global cooperation? Much will depend on the political will and fortitude of world leaders. At the United Nations, all eyes are on recently reelected [Secretary-General António Guterres](#) and what he may

achieve in his five-year term to come. In the US, *Joe Biden* is facing a deeply divided nation while seeking to reestablish unity with allies abroad.
